Dear Mr. Lambert,

Thank you for your letter on behalf of [REDACTED] which was forwarded to me by Dr. Susan Groenwald. Chamberlain University recognizes that many students who achieve excellence in their pursuit of higher education degrees are the product of home education. Our policy is not meant to limit access to graduates of homeschool programs, but is in place to ensure consistency in applying our admission criteria.

My understanding is that [REDACTED] has now earned an Associate's degree, and that the transcript has been provided to the Office of the Registrar. That documentation fully meets our requirement, so Chamberlain will not need further documentation related to [REDACTED] graduation from high school. We are very pleased that [REDACTED] application for our May session remains active, and look forward to working with [REDACTED] as [REDACTED] advances through the process.

I acknowledge that the resolution for [REDACTED] does not address the broader concerns that were expressed in your letter. While Chamberlain understands that the law cited in the letter only applies to state colleges, Chamberlain is committed to continuous improvement. As such, Chamberlain has implemented a task force to review our current policy to ensure that we are aligned with leading standards in higher education. As noted in your letter, the number of graduates from homeschool programs has grown significantly in the past few years, and our goal is to serve all of the applicants seeking admission to Chamberlain to the best of our ability. This task force is led by Mark Buck, VP of Enrollment Management and Abbey McElligott, University Registrar.
